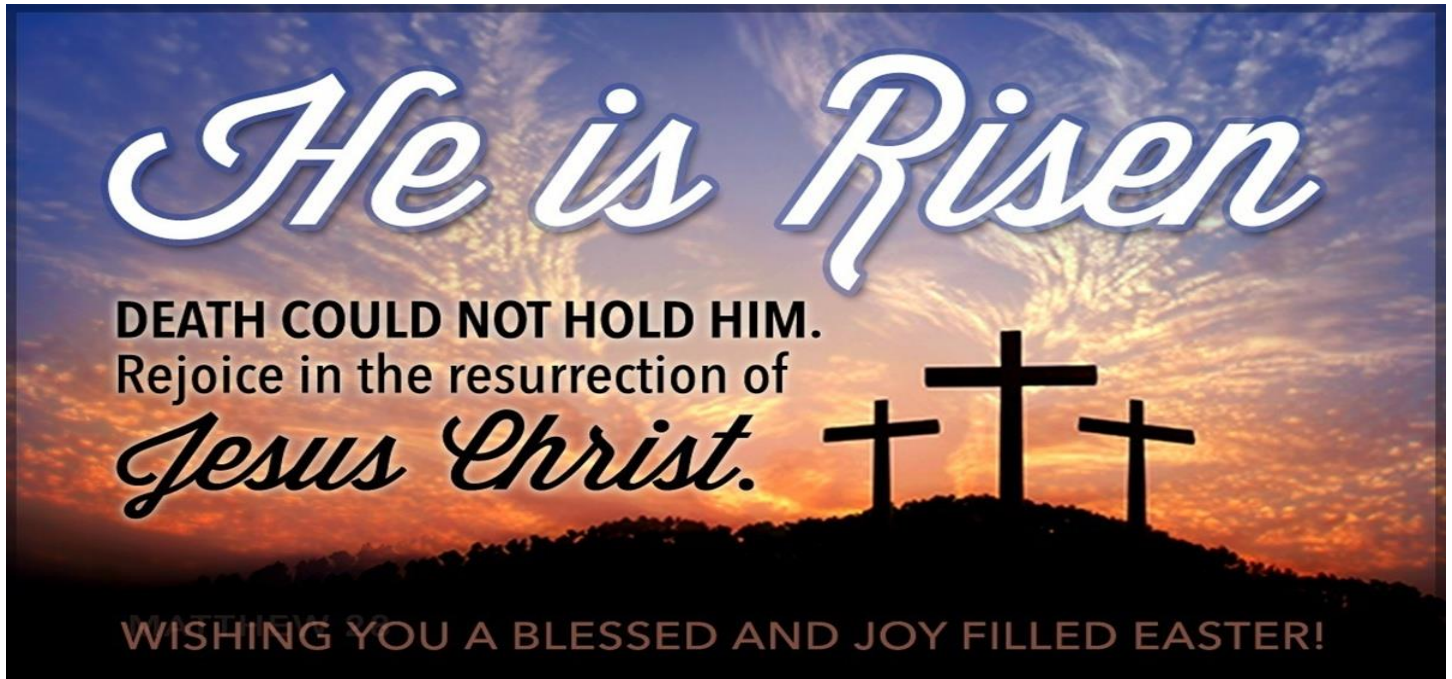

A Purpose and a Power **By Billy Graham**

“Go quickly and tell... that He is risen from the dead. Matthew 28:7

How appropriate for Easter the words from Rev. Billy Graham:

When Samuel Morse, inventor of the telegraph, sent his first message, he telegraphed these words: “What hath God wrought!”

The greatest news ever sent tells of a far greater event God has wrought: Christ is risen. On that first resurrection day, the angel at the tomb delivered the most important message anyone can ever hear: “He is not here; for He is risen” (Matthew 28:6).

When Adam and Eve first sinned, God’s warning became a reality: “You shall surely die” (Genesis 2:17). From that moment on, death reigned over the human race – and with it, fear, dread and superstition.

But Christ’s resurrection changed all that, bringing hope and salvation to all who put their trust in Him. Listen: Death is a defeated foe! Christ has won the victory. That is why Paul could say, “Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ” (1 Corinthians 15:57).

Is your confidence in Jesus Christ, the risen Lord?

The Ministry of Jesus after Easter

The resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday is the climax of the mission and ministry of Jesus, vindicating his claim to be the Son of God who laid down his life for those God had given to him to purchase their redemption. For some, that would seem to be the end of the story, but it is not. The story continues!

In the second volume of Luke's writings, he tells his patron and friend Theophilus that "in my former book I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach until the day he was taken up to heaven" (Acts 1:1-2). The gospel of Luke is about the beginning of Jesus' ministry, from the angelic annunciation to Zechariah the priest and his wife Elizabeth of the birth of the forerunner John the Baptist, through the Christmas story and the life and ministry of Jesus, culminating in his crucifixion and resurrection. But that is just the beginning! Jesus was not finished after his resurrection. Indeed, when Luke speaks of "all Jesus began to do and to teach" in volume one, his gospel account, he would seem to be implying that volume two, the Acts of the Apostles, is about all Jesus *continued* to do and to teach in the time prior to his ascension, when he appeared to the disciples and taught them for "forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God" (Acts 1:3), and then afterwards through the work of the Holy Spirit in these men and women as they proclaimed and lived out the gospel in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the uttermost parts of the earth (Acts 1:8).



Easter is not the end of the story. It is the essence of the story, if you will, the basis on which the church acts and calls the world to repent and believe in Jesus as Lord and Savior. By the empowering work of the Spirit on the Day of Pentecost, Jesus continues to minister to people as he did in the days of his earthly ministry, only now he is in many places doing works of healing, proclaiming the kingdom, and calling for people to entrust themselves to the will and way of God! We are privileged to be a part of that work and to be those through whom he works!

Each person in the church of Jesus Christ has a role to play in the ministry of Jesus. God gives special gifts by his Spirit to each person in calling that one unto himself and we do best to determine what our spiritual gifts are so that we fit God's call most suitably and effectively. There are a number of spiritual gifts inventories available online for free, so if you've never taken a brief survey like that to determine your giftedness, I would encourage you to do so. Just do a search under "spiritual gifts inventories" to see some options. You may learn that you would fit into some particular ministry of the church, or even that you might begin such a ministry if it is not already under way at Green Hill.

Certainly, each person in Christ's church should be in worship to celebrate the risen Lord. After Jesus' resurrection, the disciples were continually in the temple giving praise to God (Luke 24:52), though they also began their own house gatherings when Jewish opposition became fierce. Paul, Barnabas, Silas, Timothy, and the others of the remaining disciples of Jesus traveled throughout the Roman Empire proclaiming the gospel of Jesus and the kingdom of God, establishing churches and showing people how to live for Jesus. We can and should be about the same basic things in our day, working with people in our schools, neighborhoods, places of work, and families, calling them to follow Jesus. The work of Jesus continues! We are a part of his body, his hands, feet and mouth in the world today. May God by his Spirit use us to continue his work and bring praise to him who is the Head of the church, Jesus Christ!

Quorum present and docket approved.

Minutes from the January 2018 Session Meeting and the Annual Congregational Meeting held on January 28, 2018 were approved.

Treasurer's Report was reviewed and approved pending audit. Revenue for January was \$11,761.00. Expenses for January 2018 were \$12,683.20. Deficit for the month of January was -\$922.25. For the year to date the figures are the same.

Clerk's Report: The 2018 **Church Update Form**, the 2018 **Effective Salary Form**, the Church **Statistics** and **The Clerk's Annual Questionnaire** were all submitted to NC Presbytery. Clerk also presented the **Board of Deacons Minutes**, submitted in writing by Sue Staudt from January 14, 2018.

Session examined newly elected **Michelle Lombardi** to serve as a Deacon to St. Andrew's. A motion was made, seconded and approved to accept Michelle Lombardi as a deacon for a three-year term ending 12/31/2020.

Motions made, seconded and approved:

- Receive all reports
- Special Collection for offering for "Refugee Relief for Cameroonians" instead of the Pastors Retreat Collection for this year.
- Randy Otto will borrow church projector for training purposes when team teaching a **NT Intro** class with Rev. Grace Howard for World Mission College in Baltimore on a few Saturdays through April.
- Hold a Congregational Meeting on February 25th to approve **Joyce Sparks** (2yr term) and **Marianne Hardesty** for a 3-year term as Deacons.
- Installation of these Deacons as well as Dusty Robinson as an Elder will be done during service on March 4th.
- Friendly's Fundraiser to be held on Feb.26th, Perfect Blend Fundraiser (date TBD) and Brick Fundraiser (date TBD).
- \$250 Gift for **CYF (Cameroon Youth Fellowship)** to help offset their transportation costs when doing the service on March 11th.

The Baby Bottle Boomerang fundraiser for A Door of Hope Pregnancy Center will be held this year from Sunday, April 22 to Sunday, May 20. This is a major source of funding for A Door of Hope, which provides pregnancy testing (including ultrasounds), counseling, and support to women who are unsure of what to do in an unexpected pregnancy. Hope classes provide expectant moms with all they need to know during each step of the pregnancy process as well as what to do in the first three years following the birth of their babies. Abstinence education is provided in local schools and abortion recovery assistance to those who need emotional support following an abortion. Most importantly, all of these services are provided *free of charge* by well-trained support staff who have as their guiding principles the love of Jesus Christ and the desire to share the gospel with those who are struggling during these pivotal periods in life. DOLLARS AND SENSE - THE BOTTOM LINE

In February, St. Andrew's received \$10,167.65. That amount is \$1,825.58 less than the \$11,993.23 budgeted for the month. We spent \$14,573.13 in February. That is \$573.53 more than the budgeted expenses. The deficit for the month was \$4,405.48. The deficit for the year is \$5,327.73.

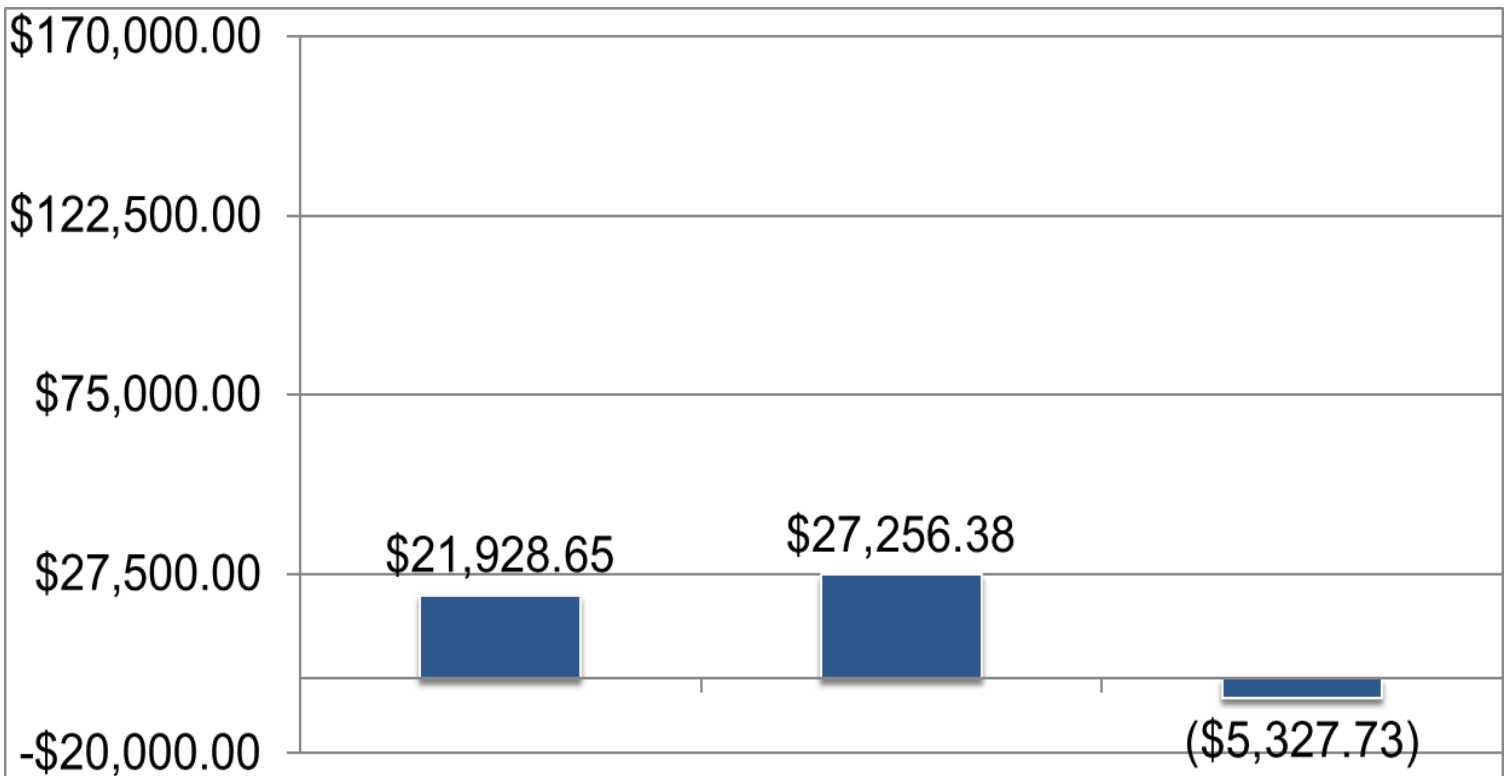
In February, St. **Andrew's** reserve funds decreased \$6,250.41. Year to date, our reserve funds have decreased \$3,795.61.

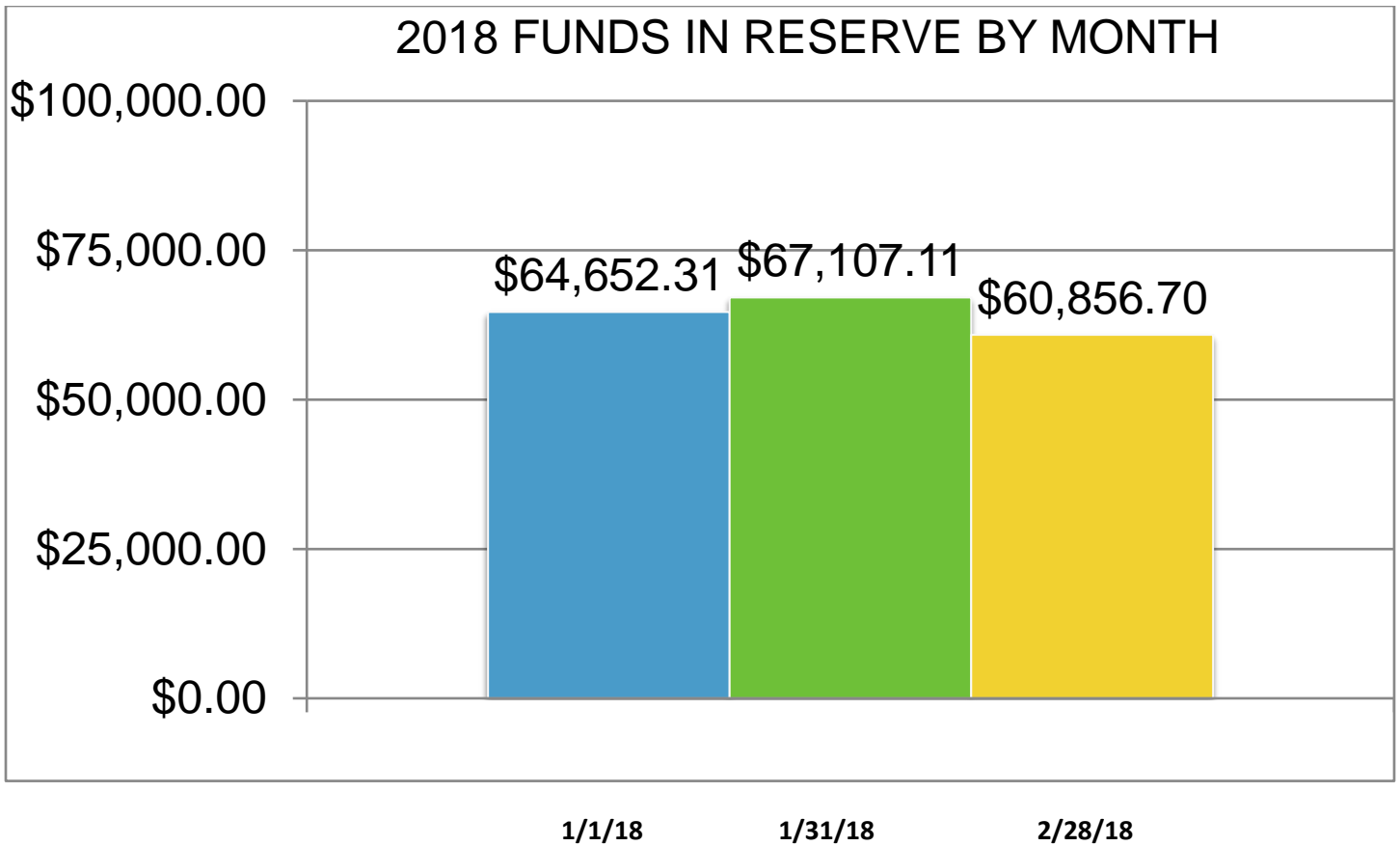
In 2017 St. **Andrew's** received \$146,592.32 and spent \$165,510.27 resulting in a deficit of \$18,917.95. Obviously, our reserves will not cover this much deficit spending for very long. At the end of December, our reserves were \$64,652.31. Our reserves at the end of 2016 were \$65,500.28. So even though we spent nearly \$19,000 more than we received, our reserves decreased by only \$857.97. Our deficit spending was almost entirely offset by increases in our investment accounts. We are thankful for God providing this increase, but we cannot depend on that continuing at that rate. However, if we continue to spend \$19,000 more then we receive each year, our reserves will be exhausted sometime in 2021.

There is little wiggle room in our budget. Salaries are 79% of our spending. Building costs are 16%. Those two categories represent 95% of the budget. Program, per capita and missions make up the remaining 5%. Any meaningful reduction in spending would have to come from salaries. Depending on the salary of our new pastor, whom I assume will be called sometime in 2018, we might be able to save a few thousand dollars there. The presbytery minimum effective salary for 2018 is \$50,917. If the new pastor is hired for the presbytery minimum, we would save about \$12,500 annually.

All Things New Castle Presbytery – March 2018

Who would turn down an opportunity to spend time at the beach?! You missed a great Retreat at Ocean City, MD (bad weather notwithstanding!) this past weekend. It was the 12th year that NCP has combined their March meeting with a retreat. The theme for this year was “Charting a New Course: Creating a New Church”. The event was kicked off Friday morning with a fantastic worship service. We were led by Bill Carter, a Presbyterian minister from Clarks Summit, PA. He has formed the Presbybop Quartet, a group of jazz musicians that play jazz music that glorifies God. Joining Bill (keyboard) were Al Hamme (sax & flute), Tony Marino (bass), and Ron Vincent (drums). Familiar hymns set to jazz riffs was so uplifting! Using the scripture of Isaiah 42:5-15, he reflected on New Songs, specifically “Be Thou My Vision”. What a way to start your day!

Worship was followed by our plenary speaker, the Rev. Dr. Harold Delhagen. He is on the staff of the Synod of the North East. He led us through a process for listening to where God is leading us. A process of transformation – listening, feedback loops, communication, adjusting and holding the community accountable! This is what New Castle Presbytery is doing. The Presbytery meeting was convened with prayer. Here are the key items from this meeting.

- Reverend Jessica MacMillan was presented and elected as the new Connectional Presbyter (5 year term) of New Castle Presbytery effective April 16, pending dismissal from the Presbytery of Western Reserve.
- May Presbytery Meeting will be held Tuesday May 15, 2018 at 4PM at Dover Presbyterian Church.
- Presbytery of Northern Kansas to ordain Jennine Money as Minister of Word and Sacrament with ordination at Georgetown PC 3PM March 25, 2018.
- Celebrated the retirement of Rev. Frank Deming
- Welcomed Rev. Kim Jackson to NCP and ministry at Dover PC.
- Alex Sprague has been advanced from Inquirer to Candidate status in PCUSA.
- 4 of 5 Overtures passed. Overture #2 (dealing with religious liberty) was blocked by one vote. See docket for specifics on each overture.
- Ignite moved to approve:
- \$5000 spark ministry grants to each congregation and new worshipping communities to “goose” your thinking of missional ministry. Churches will be given 60 days to report back. No restrictions but hope that it will be relational, creative, connectional, and bold. In 60 days we hope this will be research and development for Ignite to see how churches see missional work. We could encourage them to work with other churches because it could double or more their grant. We will also provide each church a copy of “Do Something Else.” A book written by Nate Phillips, former Assoc. Pastor at Red Clay Church. Checks will be sent out April 2.
- \$5,000 for Presbytery Mission Advocate for reimbursable expenses for conference. and events
- \$4,000 for Interfaith Resource Center
- \$10,000 matching grant to Coalition to Dismantle the New Jim Crow in support of an April 28, 2018 conference.
- Charles Gilmore, TE, Hon. Ret, was elected to serve on Committee on Ministers and Congregations, Class of 2019.
- Dave Lovelace, TE, Lower Brandywine, was elected to Trustees and Financial Resources, Class of 2018
- Recognized Bob Schminkey for his service to New Castle Presbytery over the years and most recently for serving as Stated Clerk. He has agreed to stay until the end of May during the transition of the new Connectional Presbyter who will also be serving as Stated Clerk.
