The Pentecostal Harvest

Pentecost is one of the major Christian celebrations, or at least it has been historically. It was in the Old Testament an agricultural harvest celebration, but it has become known since the resurrection of Jesus as a harvest of souls, as three thousand Jews from all over the Roman Empire who were gathered in Jerusalem for the agricultural celebration came to celebrate Jesus by the working of God's Spirit.

Below is a picture I took in 2014 of the southern wall of the temple mount in Jerusalem and the steps leading up to the temple that Jesus probably took when he entered and where Peter later may have preached that first Pentecostal sermon. On the other side of the metal fencing is a series of *mikvehs*, Jewish ritual

purification baths that would have been the place where "those who accepted his message were baptized" (Acts 2:41). These were those who "were cut to the heart" over their sin and the historical reality that "God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ" (Acts 2:36-37). As a consequence of their repentance over their sin, their turning from evil to embrace the forgiveness assured in the crucified and risen Christ, they were identified with him in baptism, according to Jesus' command in Matt. 28:19-20. Having become disciples of Christ, they then sought to obey the Lord in everything he had commanded them. Acts 2:42-47 describes their subsequent way of life in ways that seem almost idyllic:

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

The vital elements of Christian living are all embodied here in this first community of the risen Christ's people in Jerusalem:

- They devoted themselves to the apostle's teaching: they sought to learn all they could about what the Lord would teach them through his designated representatives.
- They devoted themselves to fellowship, to being together sharing in the faith, praying and worshiping together, encouraging one another to love and good works. This sharing involved table fellowship, including no doubt the Lord's Supper, and very practical sharing, such as caring for those among their community that were in need.
- They were filled with gratitude and joy, thrilled at the opportunity to praise God and share with others the good news by which they themselves had been born of God's wonderful Spirit. As a result, the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved. Their numbers grew.
- They were recognized as people of goodwill and generous, loving hearts.

This is the spirit of Pentecost that happened then and there. Let us pray it will happen again here.

DOLLARS AND SENSE - THE BOTTOM LINE


In February, St. Andrew's received \$10,167.65. That amount is \$1,825.58 less than the \$11,993.23 budgeted for the month. We spent \$14,573.13 in February. That is \$573.53 more than the budgeted expenses. The deficit for the month was \$4,405.48. The deficit for the year is \$5,327.73.


In February, St. Andrew's' reserve funds decreased \$6,250.41. Year to date, our reserve funds have decreased \$3,795.61.

In 2017 St. Andrew's received \$146,592.32 and spent \$165,510.27 resulting in a deficit of \$18,917.95. Obviously, our reserves will not cover this much deficit spending for very long. At the end of December, our reserves were \$64,652.31. Our reserves at the end of 2016 were \$65,500.28. So even though we spent nearly \$19,000 more than we received, our reserves decreased by only \$857.97. Our deficit spending was almost entirely offset by increases in our investment accounts. We are thankful for God providing this increase, but we cannot depend on that continuing at that rate. However, if we continue to spend \$19,000 more then we receive each year, our reserves will be exhausted sometime in 2021.

There is little wiggle room in our budget. Salaries are 79% of our spending. Building costs are 16%. Those two categories represent 95% of the budget. Program, per capita and missions make up the remaining 5%. Any meaningful reduction in spending would have to come from salaries. Depending on the salary of our new pastor, whom I assume will be called sometime in 2018, we might be able to save a few thousand dollars there. The presbytery minimum effective salary for 2018 is \$50,917. If the new pastor is hired for the presbytery minimum, we would save about \$12,500 annually.

The Baby Bottle Boomerang fundraiser for A Door of Hope Pregnancy Center will be held this year from Sunday, April 22 to Sunday, May 20. This is a major source of funding for A Door of Hope, which provides pregnancy testing (including ultrasounds), counseling, and support to women who are unsure of what to do in an unexpected pregnancy. Hope classes provide expectant moms with all they need to know during each step of the pregnancy process as well as what to do in the first three years following the birth of their babies. Abstinence education is provided in local schools and abortion recovery assistance to those who need emotional support following an abortion. Most importantly, all of these services are provided *free of charge* by well-trained support staff who have as their guiding principles the love of Jesus Christ and the desire to share the gospel with those who are struggling during these pivotal periods in life. 
