PRAYER EMPHASIS FOR NOVEMBER

THANK YOU!

I'm told there is an old Jewish custom created to express gratitude to the Creator, which involves stopping every ten minutes or so each day during waking hours to thank God for whatever or whoever is in front of us. It might look like this: "Thank you God for the birdsong coming from the tree outside my window this morning. Thank you, God, for scrambled eggs and the smell of bacon. Thank you for a nice, hot shower. Thank you for my spouse's smile. Thank you, God, the car started. Thank you, God, for the old man walking down the sidewalk. Thank you, God, for the red maple tree. Thank you, God, for this beautiful person I just met. Thank you for the children getting off the school bus—how energetic they are! Thank you, God, for chili and cornbread. Thank you for my dear friend who called me just now from California to wish me Happy Birthday. Thank you, God, for the setting sun. Thank you, God, for the silver moon. Thank you, God, for my comfortable bed, warm blanket, and a time of quiet rest. Thank you, thank you, thank you!" If done as described, one can end up saying "thank you" almost one hundred times a day!

That is how I feel right now, as I say "thank you" to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church for your warm welcome to me. The first picture I hung on my wall in my new home here was a plaque that reads "In ALL Things, Give Thanks," and I am finding this very easy to do. From people stopping by my study to introduce themselves and offer help in settling in, to the dedicated people who plan and run craft and bake sales, quilting groups, golf fundraisers; to the talented musicians and choir members who add so much to our worship, to the techies who run the sound board in worship, to the friendly, smiling faces sitting in the pews, to those who visit our homebound members and make phone calls, to those who provide food and drink during fellowship time, to busy Session members—to ALL of you, I say thank you!

I am also thankful to have the opportunity to participate in the work of St. Andrew's Unglued Church group. Since September, I have been meeting with this group and their coaches as they explore new ways of being church in the 21st century, and new ways to reach out to the larger Newark community with the love of God. On Saturday, October 26, I joined with the St. Andrew's group to do a Neighborhood Walk. We spent about an hour exploring the area near St. Andrew's, becoming better acquainted with the people who live and work in the neighborhoods and businesses surrounding the church. I am thankful for this wonderful way to learn more about St. Andrew's, the Brookside area, and the city of Newark.

Speaking of cities, most of you know that I spent the last two years in the city of Richmond, Virginia, at Richmond Hill, an ecumenical retreat center and Christian residential community located in an old monastery that overlooks the city. Above the arched doorway leading from the paved courtyard into the building, are the words from Jeremiah 29: 7, "Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you." The entire verse of this scripture continues "and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare." One of the ways Richmond Hill residents fulfill this mission is by praying for the welfare of metropolitan Richmond in the chapel on the grounds: three times a day, morning, noon, and evening, 365 days a year. That's a lot of praying, and it is foundational to all of the other ways this center and its inhabitants seek to provide prayer, hospitality, racial reconciliation, and spiritual formation in the city of Richmond.

That's a lot of prayer, and I find myself wanting to continue this practice. I have changed cities, but my intent is the same: to seek the welfare of the city where God has sent me. So, beginning on Wednesday, November 6, I will make my way to St. Andrew's sanctuary at noon for a short period of rest, reflection, and midday prayer for the city of Newark and the surrounding counties. I will do this at midday on most Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, barring occasional days when there may be meeting conflicts, holidays, or when I'm out of town for continuing education or vacation. This is part of my own personal prayer practice, but if you happen to be in the area around noon on those days, I would love to have you join me. "Stop-Rest-Pray"—very simple, but prayer for the city of Newark is foundational to all we at St. Andrew's are and do as the body of Christ in this particular place, at this particular time.

During these weeks leading up to Thanksgiving, I find myself blessed beyond measure. In ALL things give thanks!

FROM THE DEACONS November 2019



God designed you for victory.


In this six-session video Bible study, bestselling author Dr. David Jeremiah uses Paul's instructions in Ephesians 6:10–18–his command for us to overcome the forces of evil by putting on the armor of Godto lay out a pathway for spiritual victory.

We all know it's hard out there. Sometimes it feels like the world is ripping apart at the seams. *Overcomer* Sometimes it feels like our hearts can't take any more hurt. DOLLAR\$ AND \$EN\$E - THE BOTTOM LINE

In September, St. Andrew's received \$9,652.00. That amount is \$1,897.85 less than the \$11,549.85 budgeted for the month. We spent \$8,525.17 in September. That is \$4,600.33 less than the budgeted expenses of \$13,208.84.


There were two large expenditures. We paid \$1,495.99 for Pastor Travel - \$120.99 for a motel room when Victoria preached at St. Andrew's on 9/8 and \$1,375 for the deposit on her move to Newark from Richmond, VA. We also paid the third quarter per capita of \$819.50. All other expenses were normal.

The surplus for the month was \$1,126.83. The surplus for 2019 year to date is \$19,033.18. Our reserves at the end of September were \$91,588.86, an increase of \$1,930.48 for the month. Our reserves have increased \$30,424.28 since January 1, 2019.

Now that we will have Victoria Bethel as our new pastor beginning Tuesday, October 8, our financial situation will change. We will have to monitor that carefully.

Christians Helping Lions?! That's a Switch!

Unlike the days of the Roman Empire, when Christians were regularly thrown to the lions as a form of entertainment, we, the Christians at St. Andrew's, will be helping the local "Lions" of the Brookside Lions Club with their annual Christmas Tree Sale. In return for our help staffing the lot, St. Andrew's will receive half of the profits from the sale. Last year, half the proceeds amounted to around \$2,000. Our church will not have to put any money up front to buy the trees or set up the area where the trees are sold on Chestnut Hill Rd.

What do we have to do? It all starts with a Fence Party on Saturday, November 23 to set up the fence surrounding the Christmas tree lot. That starts at 9 am until the job is finished. All are invited to help. Then on Sat., November 30, the trees will be delivered. Again, all are invited to help unload and set up the trees – tbd.

Starting Sunday, December 1, St. Andrew's will man the Christmas tree lot every other day. Weekdays the shift will be from 4 pm to 9 pm. On Saturdays, we will be there from either 9 am to 3 pm or from 3 pm to 9 pm. On Sundays, St. Andrew's will always have the 3 pm to 9 pm shift so we can go to church Sunday morning. When St. Andrew's isn't selling trees, the Lions Club will be selling trees and vice versa. At least 2 adults will need to work each shift. At least one member of the youth group will also be there to help load trees.

Look for a sign-up sheet. It will be a large calendar with space to sign up for each day St. Andrew's is scheduled to sell Christmas trees from December 1 until the trees are gone, no later than December 23.

For as long as I can remember, the Lions Club has sold trees in the same location in Brookside. They can no longer do this by themselves. Without our help, it won't happen. So, get together with friends and / or family members and sign up to make folks' Christmas a little merrier by selling them a beautiful, fresh Christmas tree from the Brookside Lions, and in the process make some extra income for St. Andrew's.
